

A snow day in Tallahassee, a frozen Westcott fountain, or a white Landis Green - yes it can happen, but rarely. Typically, chilly mornings can transform into crisp or even warm afternoons that define a Tallahassee winter. For instance, during week of the now-famous January 2014 snow day, the low temperatures were frozen in the thirties for four of those days, while the thermometer reached the 60s and 70s in the afternoon. However, if your student insists they need a sub-zero parka to survive, take a moment and consider the following alternatives.

- Media (television, phone, etc) Knowing the forecast is absolutely the best weather protection. Local forecasts can easily be found from the National Weather Service
- Jackets Look into acquiring a trio of light, medium, and heavy weights (and you
  might be able to eliminate the heavy-weight with layering).
- Closed toe shoes (and socks) Even a pair of boots can be helpful. However, native Tallahasseans have been known to wear flip-flops year round.
- Scarves and gloves Great for surviving that early morning chill, and easily stow away
  in pockets or backpacks.
- Rain gear-- An umbrella is essential. A lightweight rain jacket or poncho, and even rain boots can protect from the extra chill on a damp winter day. Stay dry.
- Common Sense Students will figure out their tolerance to the winter temperatures, and anything they might need is available at national chain stores, campus stores, or on-line. Since the temperatures can change by 30+ degrees throughout the day, layering is the best way to deal with the variant temperatures.

An overlooked aspect of winter is the responsibility for pets, plants, and pipes. Bring mammals inside on cold nights. Locate fish, birds, and reptiles away from drafts or windows to maintain their core body heat. Cover plants or bring them inside. The lease agreement might require the water to drip on nights when temperatures are expected to dip below a certain temperature. Also, students can avoid the unwelcome surprise of high utility bills by using a reasonable setting on heaters. An extra blanket on the bed and in the living room allows the thermostat to be lowered.

Finally, if you, or your student, use the cooler temperatures as an excuse to buy an entire winter wardrobe-go for it. But be prepared for your student to soon complain about an overstuffed closet, and that they really don't need all that stuff. And remember, spring break is right around the corner!

Since North Florida is affected by cold fronts far more than the peninsula, and the arrival of these fronts is irregular, the daily maximum and minimum temperatures in the north fluctuate far more from their averages than elsewhere in the state. Unlike peninsular Florida, which is normally dry during the winter, North Florida has an appreciable number of wet winter days. During a winter month, five to six cold fronts typically reach North Florida. Most of these cold fronts pass into the peninsula but weaken rapidly as they progress southward. Cold, dry air usually arrives after the passage of these fronts, and, while the sun shines during cloudless days, the temperatures can drop quickly during the night. However, the entire state is vulnerable to the passage of extremely strong cold fronts. These Arctic Air Outbreaks can bring freezing temperatures to even the central and southern parts of the state.

During some winters, El Niño Southern Oscillation (ENSO) helps dominate the overall winter weather pattern. El Niño episodes bring cooler than normal temperatures and increases in the average precipitation during the winter months. La Niña winters are typically warmer and drier than normal.


