Mark your calendars: Thesis Forum is Fri., Nov. 7 at 1:00 pm in FAB 332. Second year M.A. students **Sarah Andyshak, Deirdre Carter, Stephanie Chadwick, Arenthia Herren**, **Brad Hostetler**, **Ressa Mackey**, and **Mary Slavkin** will present the state of their research. This is an excellent opportunity to support your colleagues and contribute to art historical discourse.

Sarah Andyshak is working with Prof. Emmerson on her topic, fifteenth-century English manuscripts of the *Book of Sir John Mandeville*. Ms. Andyshak traveled to London this past summer as part of her research.

Deidre Carter, directed by Prof. Emmerson, focuses her research on the narrative manuscripts of the thirteenth-century English monk, author, and artist Matthew Paris. Ms. Carter traveled to London, Cambridge, and Dublin this past summer to conduct research.

Stephanie Chadwick, directed by Profs. Jolles and Weingarden, is researching Redon's *Noirs* in relation to changing conceptualizations of evil in symbolist art and literature for her thesis "Introversion, Abstraction, and Transcendence: Origins and Evil in the Graphic Works of Odilon Redon."

Arenthia Herren, directed by Asst. Prof. Stephanie Leitch, is researching the European conception of the "Wild Man" in relation to representations of New World Natives.

Brad Hostetler, directed by Asst. Prof. Lynn Jones, is researching Meryemana Kilise, an eleventh-century rock-cut church in Göreme, Turkey. As part of his research, Mr. Hostetler traveled to Cappadocia this past summer to view the wall paintings *in situ*.

Ressa Mackey, directed by Prof. Roald Nasgaard, is researching the ephemeral costumes that are created each year for the Junkanoo festival in the Bahamas. She is interested in the intersection of popular culture and museological practices. Ms. Mackey will be traveling to Nassau in December as part of her research.

Mary Slavkin is working with Assoc. Prof. Weingarden on her thesis, which connects Gustave Moreau's lustful female to the base animal in his images and writing. Ms. Slavkin traveled to France this summer to conduct research.

Students to Attend Art Basel Miami Beach

Generously funded by an anonymous donation, 24 MFAs, 15 BFAs, 3 Art History Graduate Students, and 4 Art History Undergraduates will attend Art Basel Miami Beach Dec. 4 - 7.

The sister event of Switzerland's Art Basel, Art Basel Miami Beach is the most important art show in the United States. It combines an international selection of top galleries with an exciting program of special exhibitions, parties, and crossover events featuring music, film, architecture, and design.

Exhibition sites are located in the Art Deco District, within walking distance of the beach. Two hundred-twenty leading art galleries from North America, Latin America, Europe, Asia, and Africa will exhibit 20th- and 21st-century artworks by over 2,000 artists. Special exhibition sections

feature young galleries, performance art, public art projects and video art.



Professors and Graduate Students Present Papers

Asst. Prof. Michael Carrasco will conduct a week-long workshop on Maya writing at the Universidad de Oriente, Valladoid, Yucatán, Oct. 20-24. While there, he will also present a paper on Classic Maya literature. He will present, "Singing in the Black-Speared-Earth Cave: The Poetics of the Vessel of the Eighty-eight Glyphs," at the Association of American Anthropologists Meeting, Nov. 19-23, as part of the session "Parallel Worlds: Genre, Discourse, and Poetics in Contemporary, Colonial, and Classic Maya Literature," which he co-organized with Kerry Hull (Reitaku University) in honor of J. Kathryn Josserand.

Asst. Prof. Lynn Jones will chair Session I, "Archaeology: New Evidence" at the 33rd Annual Byzantine Studies Conference to be held at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, Oct. 16 - 19. Nov. 23 she will present "Pious Ancestry and the Decorative Programs of the Church of

the Holy Cross at Aght'amar," at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

Assoc. Prof. Lauren Weingarden presented a paper, "Manet's Realism and the Erotic Gaze: Photography, Pornography and Censorship," at "Efficacy / Efficacité," the 8th International Conference of the International Association of Word and Image Studies in Paris July 7 through 11. She also co-organized and chaired three panels on "Censorship" with Prof. Karen Carter from the University of North Florida at this same conference.

Karlyn Griffith (Ph.D. student) presented "Viewing the Romance of Antichrist in the Miniatures of the *Jour du Jugement*, MS Besançon 579" at the Florida State University Art History Department's 26th Annual Symposium, Oct. 17 and 18.
