Though its participation in the VA's **Yellow Ribbon** educational-benefits program, Florida State makes it possible for out-of-state veterans to attend FSU with no out-of-pocket tuition costs.

The FSU Veteran Liaison Program provides student-veterans with personalized and expert support within their academic majors.

MAY 2012

A deeper understanding of veterans issues and better ways to serve student veterans were identified during the inaugural **Seminole Veteran Benefits Expo**, which hosted a broad gathering of faculty, staff, students and student-veterans, as well as providers of resources for veterans.

At the Expo, student-veterans presented research from an FSU sociology course on the unique challenges student-veterans face, and how they manage those challenges.

AUGUST 2012

With its Summer 2012 commencement, Florida State University began saluting its graduating student-veterans and ROTC cadets with:

- ★ An exclusive graduation reception at the FSU president's home
- ★ Distinctive red, white and blue honor cords for veterans and cadets to wear at graduation ceremonies

Florida Gov. Rick Scott asked FSU student-veterans to be present when he signed two bills to help veterans in their quest to earn college degrees.

SEPTEMBER 2012


Student-veterans had an exclusive opportunity to network with employers the night before the university's fall career fair during **Student Veterans Networking Night**.

President Barron invited student-veterans to watch the home football game designated for **Military Appreciation** from the president's skybox.

OCTOBER 2012

Visiting artists conducted a three-day paper, book and printmaking workshop with student veterans, art therapists, fine art students and community members. An independent documentary filmmaker recorded the **Peace Paper Project** workshop and its resulting artwork will be showcased in the main FSU library. The **Leon County Commission** passed a resolution commending the FSU chapters of the Collegiate Veterans Association and Thank a Soldier Organization for their support of student and civilian veterans.



NOVEMBER 2012

The Tallahassee armory of the National Guard sponsored its **First Annual Chili Cook-off** and the entire proceeds of this successful event were presented to the FSU chapter of the Collegiate Veterans Association.

The 2012 **Student Veterans Film Festival** featured *The Invisible War*, a powerful documentary that examined the issue of military sexual trauma. The festival was attended by subjects of the film and its director and received national media attention.

The director of *The Invisible War*, Kirby Dick, was presented with the inaugural FSU Student Veteran **Torchlight Award** for Outstanding Achievement in Filmmaking, which included a \$25,000 grant.
